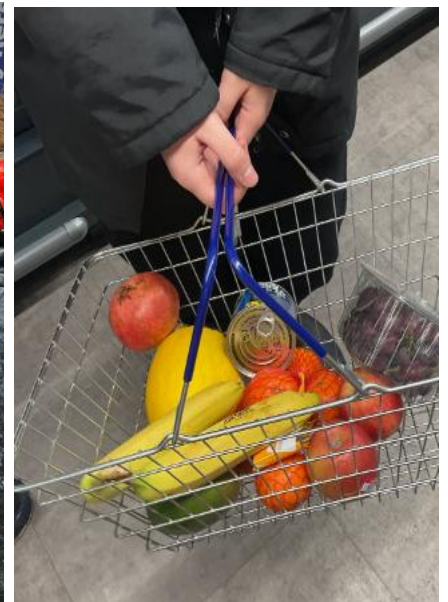

## Gareth Baker visit

Author Gareth Baker recently visited Sutherland House School to host an exciting workshop all about superheroes and what it's like to be an author. During his visit, he shared insights into how he creates his characters, builds thrilling storylines, and finds inspiration for his books. Pupils had the opportunity to explore their own superhero ideas, thinking about unique powers, secret identities, and daring adventures. Gareth also spoke about the writing process, encouraging students to use their imagination, believe in their ideas, and enjoy the journey of storytelling. ## PE – KS4 Inclusive Handball tournament

On 15th January at Harvey Haddon Leisure Centre in Nottingham seven students represented Sutherland House School in a Key Stage 4 inclusive indoor Handball tournament organised by Sports Nottingham. The seven students were from classes 16, 15 and 13. They were supported by familiar staff and their participation in the event is evidence towards either their ASDAN or OCR PE accreditation.

Sutherland House School played five competitive games against other SEN and mainstream schools from Nottingham and Nottinghamshire. Results as follows:

This was an excellent win loss ratio, and the players can be very proud of their efforts. The games are always very well organised and structured and were marshalled by Sports Nottingham and leads of PE from all the schools.

In the final game we had a rematch against Foxwood (who had not won a game all tournament) and our students unprompted spoke with their PE Lead and agreed to have less players on the pitch and only use their non-dominant hand to pass and shoot. The PE Lead from Foxwood was highly complementary about the student's maturity, sense of fairness and sportsmanship. This was incredible to see and all the staff supporting the event are very proud of how they have represented the school.



## Deflect and protect

Deflect and Protect CIC was founded in February 2024 by Alistair Barfield as an extension of his previous work in media literacy. The organisation is a digital harms training provider that promotes the benefits of the internet while addressing its risks. In its first year, Deflect and Protect has delivered training sessions across the UK to local authorities, academy trusts, violence reduction partnerships and the Home Office, reaching over 3,000 participants and receiving 100% positive feedback. Alongside this, the organisation has undertaken consultancy work to help improve the criminal justice system for neurodivergent individuals and to develop neurodiversity-friendly training environments.

As part of its ongoing outreach, Deflect and Protect delivered a dedicated online safety workshop at Sutherland House School for both parents and students. The session explored the risks and benefits of the digital world, offering practical guidance on recognising online harms, understanding vulnerability to radicalisation, and making safe, informed choices online. The workshop encouraged open discussion and provided families with strategies to support young people in navigating the internet confidently and responsibly. The session was very well received, with positive feedback from both parents and students.





## Assemblies

This term, pupils have been exploring the following themes in assembly: New Years, RSPB Big Bird Watch, World Religions Day, Burns Night, Children's Mental Health Week and Safer Internet Day.

For Children's Mental Health Week, pupils were challenged to take part in Place2Be's 'This is my place' art project. Pupils created a map of everything that belongs in their world. In assembly, pupils were encouraged to share what belonging means to them, share differences and similarities to the person sitting next to them and do an act of kindness to ensure others feel welcome. Pupils were very mature and had some wonderful interactions with each other. Here is a brilliant example of 'This is my place' project from a pupil in class 11.

Sutherland House School recently welcomed families for a special “Lunch with Your Child” event, giving parents and carers the opportunity to share a meal alongside their children during the school day.
